diation Oncology's (ASTRO's) 2011 Nurse Excellence Award. Each year, ASTRO's Nurse Excellence Award recognizes a nurse and ASTRO member who goes above and beyond the normal standards of nursing practice, promoting excellence in direct patient care and positively portraying the nursing profession.

"Linda is dedicated to patient service and to both patient and nursing education," said David S. Parda, MD, chair of the WPAHS radiation oncology network. "She has truly been a primary leader and driving force within our program to optimize and advance patient care and has done so with expert level competencies and the values of service and collegiality."

Meyer received the award, a \$1,000 grant, this past October. She works to improve care throughout the WPAHS radiation oncology program via the development of specified care plans and processes for treatment assessment and follow-up, as well as clinical trial accrual. Meyer also takes a leading role in implementing electronic medical record processes throughout the radiation oncology network, streamlining operations to benefit the network's 3,000 patients.

In addition to her daily work, Meyer serves on the board of the Greater Pittsburgh chapter of ONS and serves as cochair for "Camp Raising Spirits," an annual weekend getaway for cancer patients and their families. She earned her bachelor's degree in nursing from Duquesne University and coordinates with Duquesne to provide clinical rotations for second-degree nursing students pursuing their BSN degrees.

"I've loved working with cancer patients ever since I began nursing school at Cornell University," Tunon said. "It's incredibly inspiring to work with patients and staff at an institution where the latest cancer care and research is offered. It was very exciting to move into the Hillman Cancer Center in 2002 and develop a firstclass Patient and Family Resource Center, as well as ongoing educational classes. I am proud to say the Resource Center has become the home of patient navigation, providing patients with convenient access to supportive care services and referrals to community organizations."

Each week day, Tunon teaches a chemotherapy education class at the Hillman Cancer Center. After class, she serves as the go-to nurse for patients with questions about managing side effects of cancer treatment. Tunon also updates cancer education materials and is an active member of CPEN's Learning Resource Center and marketing and membership committees.

Tunon began working as an information specialist in 1993 and then became an oncology educator. Over the course of her tenure, she earned her MSN from Duquesne University and her oncology nursing certification.

RWJF Calls for Nursing Research Proposals

RWJF is soliciting research proposals that address nursing practice, care, and education for consideration by RWJF and its partners in a multifunder initiative. Research proposals will be considered in the context of a national research agenda developed to help RWJF and its partners confront the issues facing the nursing profession and build on approaches to care in which nurses play a central role in improving quality and transforming the way Americans receive health care.

The RWJF Interdisciplinary Nursing Quality Research Initiative is managing the initiative for RWJF and is accepting proposals until January 3, 2012.

Among the types of research projects being considered are quick studies and scans, policy analyses, secondary data quantitative analyses, descriptive studies and case studies, demonstrations and evaluations, and theoretical modeling. To be considered, projects should address at least one of the following.

- Remove scope-of-practice barriers for advanced practice RNs.
- Expand opportunities for nurses to lead and diffuse collaborative improvement efforts.
- Implement nurse residency programs.
- Increase the proportion of nurses with a bachelor's degree to 80% by 2020.
- Double the number of nurses with a doctorate by 2020.
- Ensure that nurses engage in lifelong learning.
- Prepare and enable nurses to lead change to advance health.
- Build an infrastructure for the collection and analysis of interprofessional healthcare workforce data.
